Imagine... instead of getting up, getting ready, commuting to campus, finding something to do between classes and then driving home, you could live within walking distance from all of your classes. You'll also have access to popular dining options, workout facilities and numerous extracurricular activities. The independence of living on campus will teach you invaluable life skills and introduce you to lifelong friends.

Grand Canyon University's Office of Housing Operations is here to help you make a seamless transition into campus life. Our hope is that this guide can answer any questions you have about living on campus—from the residence hall setup and housing policies to the application process and how to pick a roommate. If you or your parents have questions, contact your admissions counselor or the Office of Housing Operations. Here at GCU, we're officially rolling out the welcome mat just for you.



DEFINITIONS

Grand Canyon University provides you with both convenience and the opportunity to enjoy a traditional student experience. Our goal is to provide a safe, comfortable space for you to live. GCU offers suite-style student housing accommodations in all of our living areas for both freshmen and upperclassmen.

DOUBLE OCCUPANCY:

Student will share a bedroom with one direct roommate. If a student's suite has two bedrooms (most do), that student will have one roommate and two suitemates (four total occupants).

HOUSING OPERATIONS:

Housing Operations manages the logistical and infrastructural needs of the residential community on campus.

INCOMING STUDENT:

Incoming students are new students who are 17–19-years-old at the start of the academic term.

LIFE LEADER:*

Life leaders are students within each living area who serve as a resource, offering support and spiritual formation opportunities for residents.

RA:*

Resident assistants (RAs) are student leaders hand-picked by the Residence Life staff to serve in every living area to help foster community, create accountability for university living area policies and act as a resource to residential students.

RD:

Resident directors (RDs) are full-time, professional, live-in staff members who provide leadership and supervision for the resident assistants.

RETURNING STUDENT:

Returning students are traditional students who have previously attended GCU and hold a freshman, sophomore, junior or senior standing.

SINGLE OCCUPANCY:

Student will have their own bedroom, but will share a bathroom with one suitemate. The common area will be shared with one to three suitemates. Applies to apartments only.

STUDIO SINGLE OCCUPANCY:

Student will have their own bedroom, but will share a bathroom with one suitemate. There is no common living area or kitchen. A small refrigerator and microwave are provided. Applies to apartments only.

TRANSFER STUDENT:

Transfer students are new students who are 20–25-years-old at the start of the academic term.

TRIPLE OCCUPANCY:

Student will share a bedroom with two direct roommates. There is a limited number of triple occupancy rooms available. Rooms are the same size as double occupancy rooms and provide furniture including a loft bed, extra dresser, desk and chair.

RESIDENCE HALL AND APARTMENT REQUIREMENTS

INCOMING RESIDENCE HALLS

To live in the residence halls as an incoming student you must be:

- An incoming student
- A minimum of 17-years-old and not exceed 19-years-old at the start of the academic term
- Registered as a full-time undergraduate student (12 or more credits, at least eight of which must be taken on campus)

TRANSFER RESIDENCE HALLS

To live in the residence halls as a transfer student, you must be:

- An incoming student
- Be a minimum of 20-years-old and not exceed 25-years-old at the start of the academic term
- Registered as a full-time undergraduate student (12 or more credits, at least eight of which must be taken on campus)

RETURNING RESIDENCE HALLS

To live in the residence halls as a returning student, you must:

- · Be a GCU returning student
- · Not exceed 25-years-old at the start of the academic term
- Be registered as a full-time undergraduate student (12 or more credits, at least eight of which must be taken on campus)

APARTMENTS

To live in the apartments, you must:

- Be a GCU student
- Not exceed 25-years-old at the start of the academic term
- Be registered as a full-time student (12 or more credits, at least eight of which must be taken on campus)

Q: WHO QUALIFIES TO LIVE ON CAMPUS?

A: GCU housing requirements are outlined as follows:

- · Admitted undergraduate student at GCU
- Student must be 17-25-years-old at the start of the academic term
- · Meets residential course load requirement (see below)
- Approved Immunizations*

GCU incoming housing eligibility requirements are outlined as follows:

• Incoming students 17-19-years-old at the start of the academic term

GCU transfer housing eligibility requirements are outlined as follows:

• Transfer students 20-25-years-old at the start of the academic term

GCU returning student housing and apartment eligibility:

• Be a GCU returning student with a freshman, sophomore, junior or senior standing

Students must maintain full-time enrollment status (12 credits) to be eligible to remain in campus housing. Students must also maintain at least eight credits of their overall 12 in the traditional ground modality.

Individuals who pose a clear and present danger to other residents (including, but not limited to registered sex offenders) are not eligible to live in university housing. Individuals with felonies on their record will be required to disclose details of the felony. The university retains the right to not offer housing to the student on a case-by-case basis at the sole discretion of GCU's Housing Background Check Committee.

0: WHERE DO NEW STUDENTS LIVE?

A: Most new students live in one of the residence halls on campus that are classified as either freshman or transfer housing. In the event that incoming-only housing fills up and all returning students have selected housing, incoming students may be placed with returning students.

0: HOW WILL I BENEFIT FROM LIVING ON CAMPUS?

A: As a result of living in university housing, students can become Christ-like servant leaders through an awareness of self and engagement with others. Research indicates that students who reside on campus are more satisfied with their college experience, perform stronger academically and are more likely to graduate within four years than their commuting classmates. In addition, they have a strong support system with peers who are going through similar experiences.

O: WHAT DO STUDENTS DO FOR FUN ON CAMPUS?

A: GCU students participate in a variety of activities including intramurals, events planned by the Office of Student Engagement, Arena concerts, sporting events, outdoor activities, theatre performances and Bible studies. There are also several shopping centers, restaurants and movie theaters nearby. Ask your RA about monthly community gatherings and building events.

0: DOES GCU HAVE CO-ED HOUSING?

A: Cohabitation is not permitted on campus. Each building has separate housing areas for each legal sex. Daily open hall hours allow students of the opposite legal sex to visit friends in each suite's living room.

O: IN WHAT WAYS CAN I PERSONALIZE MY ROOM?


A: You may decorate your room with fun bedding, photos of friends and family, throw pillows, rugs, etc. You may also hang posters using 3M[®] hooks or staples.

0: WHAT ARE ROOM AND BOARD COSTS?

A: Cost varies depending on the type of housing you select. Please discuss cost breakdown with your admissions counselor.

* Proof of MMR (Measles, mumps and rubella) & meningococcal A immunization records on file with the university meeting the Canyon Health and Wellness Center specifications





Q: WHEN/HOW DO I FIND OUT THE NAME AND CONTACT INFORMATION OF MY FUTURE ROOMMATE?

A: Once you have completed the online housing application, you will be able to look up the name and contact information of your roommate(s) at any time by logging into the housing application, clicking the "Application" tab, then "Status" and finally "View Profile" next to your roommate's name. Housing Operations is not able to provide this information due to privacy policies.

Q: HOW DO I LIVE WITH MY FRIEND WHO IS ALSO ATTENDING GCU?

A: Incoming or transfer students and returning students are not permitted to live together. Incoming students who want to live with another specific incoming GCU student need to coordinate by making the same room reservation on the online housing application. The Office of Housing Operations does not "place" students in their housing assignments and will not coordinate the reservations of students who want to live together.

Q: WHAT KIND OF INTERNET ACCESS IS AVAILABLE ON CAMPUS?

A: Wireless Internet (Wi-Fi) is provided in the residence halls and apartments.

0: IS THERE CABLE TV?

A: Yes. There is a cable hookup in the living room of all residence halls and apartments. Basic cable is provided in the living areas at no extra cost to the resident.

0: IS THERE AIR CONDITIONING?

A: Yes. Every room has air conditioning and heating with an individual thermostat that has been set by the facilities staff with a specific temperature range. Upon your arrival, discuss an ideal room temperature with your roommates. Students may not tamper with GCU property. NRA is operated from a chiller/boiler system. Air conditioning and heating are not available simultaneously.

Q: WHEN CAN I MOVE IN?

A: You will be assigned a specific move-in time and date based upon your housing assignment. Fall move-in is approximately one week before classes begin.

Spring move-in for new students is the Saturday before classes begin.

Q: DO I NEED TO BRING COINS FOR LAUNDRY FACILITIES?

A: The laundry facilities in all residence halls and apartments accept coins or credit/debit cards. Lopes Cash is not an acceptable form of payment.

Q: CAN I LOFT/BUNK MY BED?

A: You may bunk beds to create more space efficiency. Submit a facilities request to get bed pins. This does not apply to all living areas. Please check with your RA or RD. Mallets can also be temporarily checked out from the RA/RD as available.

Q: CAN I BRING MY OWN BED? AND/OR CAN I HAVE THE UNIVERSITY-PROVIDED FURNITURE REMOVED FROM MY ROOM?

A: No. All university-provided furniture must remain in the room and intact through the duration of a student's stay on campus. Any removed or missing furniture at the end of the year will result in housing fines.

0: CAN I HAVE MY OWN ROOM?

A: Returning students have the opportunity to choose a private room in some of the apartment living areas. If you have a housing accommodation that requires a private room, you must contact the Disability Services Office and submit to a general screening process.

Q: THE RESIDENCE HALL I WANT IS FULL. CAN I GET ON A WAITLIST?

A: Yes. When living areas are at capacity, we start waitlists. If you are interested in being placed on a waitlist, you must choose another residence hall. Waitlist requests submitted from parents or admissions counselors will not be accepted.



Q: WHEN DO I CHOOSE MY MEAL PLAN?

A: You will be able to make your meal plan selection and changes during the online housing application process.

O: WHERE DO I PARK MY CAR IF I LIVE ON CAMPUS?

A: All parking inquiries must be directed to Campus Operations (602-639-7739).

Q: CAN I STORE MY BELONGINGS AT GCU OVER THE SUMMER?

A: No. GCU does not offer student storage. We recommend storing items at one of the many local public storage facilities.

Q: WHAT SECURITY MEASURES HAVE BEEN IMPLEMENTED ON CAMPUS?

A: The safety of GCU students, faculty and staff is a top priority. Security measures on campus include 24-hour public safety officers at gated entrances, uniformed police officers, controlled key-access to residential buildings and emergency blue-light phones located throughout campus and in parking garages.





WHAI TO DRING/ WHAI NOT TO DRING

Here is a list of items you'll want to bring to your residence hall or apartment. Also included are things you should leave at home. If you have any questions, contact the Office of Residence Life at **ResidenceLife@gcu.edu** or **602-639-6244.**

Take the time to communicate with your roommates and discuss what you'll each bring. This helps speed up the move-in process and ensures there won't be unnecessary multiples in your suite (extra microwaves, TVs or approved furniture). HOUSING & STUDENT CONDUCT POLICIES



REFRIGERATOR POLICY

To avoid overloading electrical circuits, only one refrigerator and one microwave are permitted per room in each suite, up to three total (living room counts as a "room"). Students in campus apartments may not bring small, personal refrigerators.

ROOM RESERVATION CHANGE POLICY

A student may contact the Housing Operations Office to inquire about switching room reservations or roommates through July 1. All requests to change room reservations or roommates after this date will be denied.

HOUSING APPLICATION FEE REFUND POLICY

A one-time housing application fee of \$250 is required of all new residents. This fee is non-refundable and non-transferable.

HOUSING CANCELLATION/ REIMBURSEMENT POLICY

STUDENT CONDUCT

GCU students are required to treat each other, faculty and staff with courtesy and respect at all times. Each individual plays a role in developing a harmonious campus community and as such is held to the standards outlined in the Student Handbook.

COMMUNITY STANDARDS

GCU is first and foremost a Christian university and as such upholds a commitment to maintaining an environment on campus that honors God. While students do not have to sign a Statement of Faith or be a Christian to attend GCU, they are expected to abide by the Community Standards. College of Theology students are required to affirm additional standards. Please consult the University Policy Handbook for information. The Community Standards uphold certain university values that are believed to enhance the overall moral fabric of the community.

The Community Standards identify essential values that GCU students are expected to exhibit in their interactions with one another, faculty and staff. Our expectation is that students reflect what is known as the "fruit of the Spirit" in their behavior. This includes demonstrating love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Our vision is that students strive to treat others as they would want to be treated.


COMMUNITY EXPECTATIONS

Our goal is to develop a community based on the biblical principles of respect and honor. We as community members strive to encourage one another, respect one another's differences, speak truthfully and create lasting relationships. We understand that these actions are most possible as a result of choosing to put others above ourselves and to look out for the interests of others.

UNIVERSITY EXPECTATIONS

More specifically, the GCU Community Standards include, but are not limited to the following:

- **1.** All students comply with the university polices as a matter of respect for the community as a whole.
- 2. All students demonstrate mutual respect and courtesy to one another, faculty and staff. Physical abuse, verbal abuse, threats, intimidation, harassment coercion and/or other conduct which threatens or endangers the health and safety of any person will not be tolerated.
- **3.** GCU is committed to maintaining a drug and alcohol-free community. Being under the influence of, using, possession of or distributing illegal drugs or possessing drug paraphernalia on campus or at university-sanctioned events will not be tolerated. Failure to comply with these policies will result in police involvement as well as university sanctions.
- 4. GCU also maintains a dry campus and as such alcohol is not permitted on GCU property. Consuming or possessing alcohol on campus, engaging in under-age drinking, providing alcohol to minors, disorderly or dangerous conduct due to intoxication or driving under the influence are strictly prohibited. Violations of the alcohol policy will be taken seriously and consequences include university sanctions and police involvement if under-age consumption or serving is involved.
- **5.** Guests are the responsibility of the student who is hosting them. Their actions and behavior are viewed as the actions and behavior of the student host.


